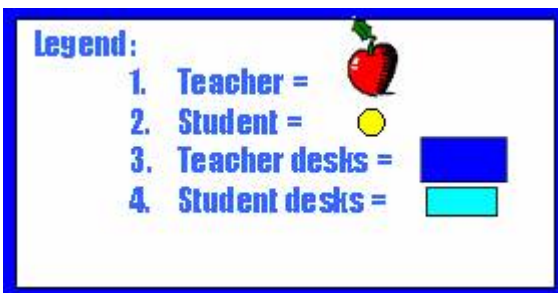
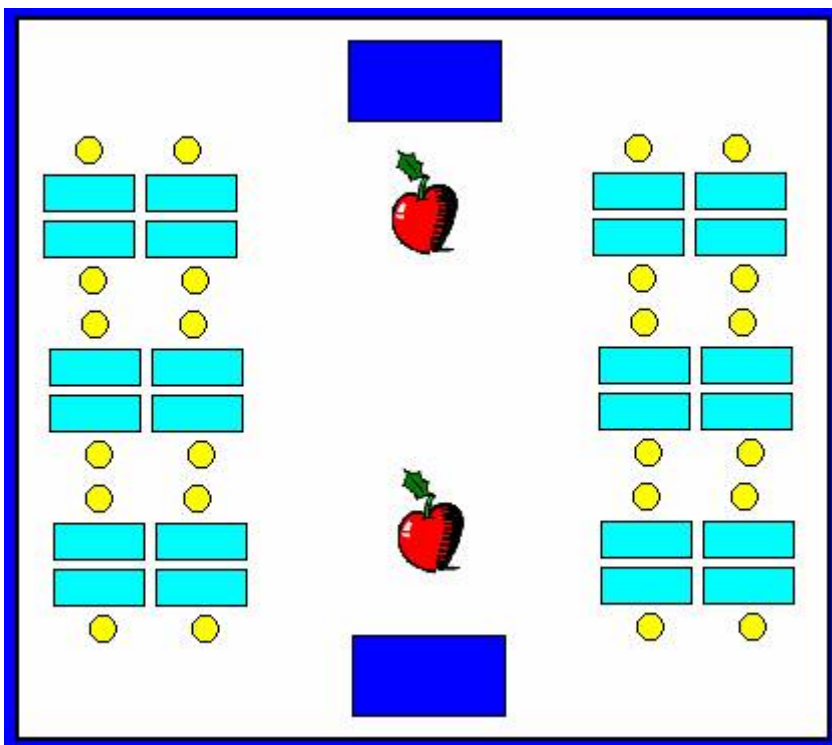
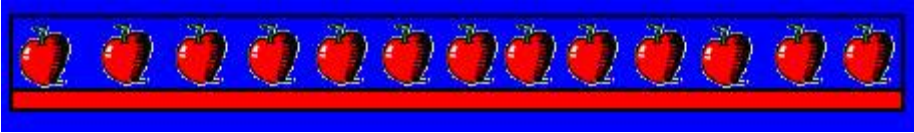


# Classroom floor plan designs to optimize each type of collaboration:

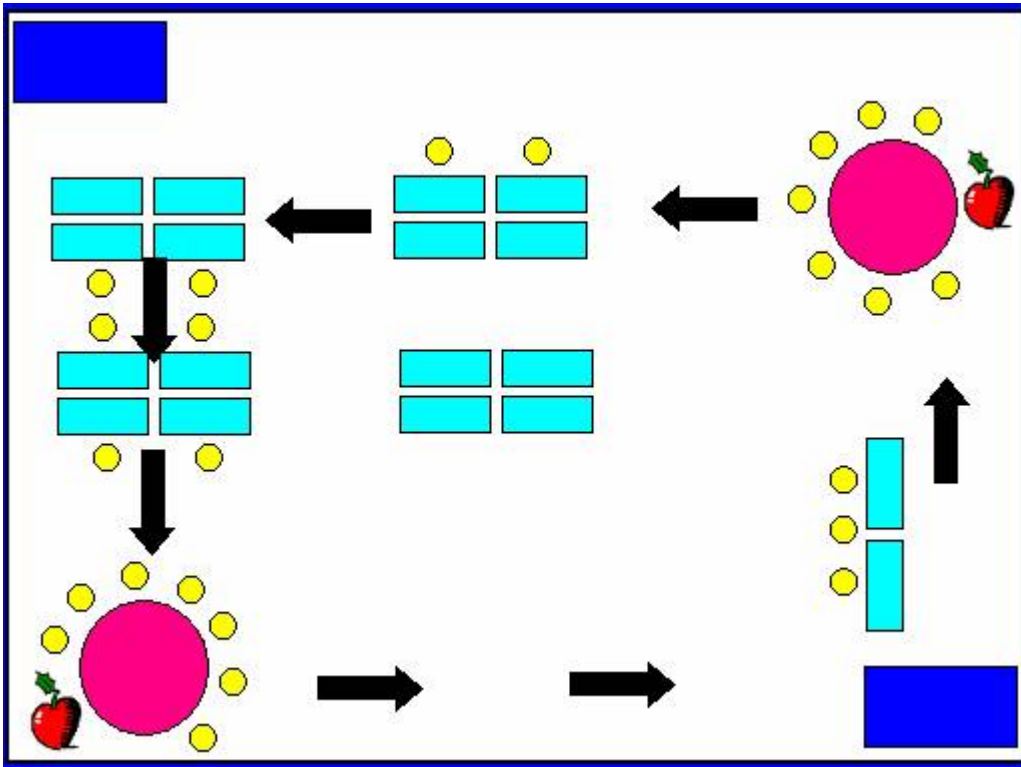
**Part 1 One teaching, one drifting**—This model of inclusion does not require any classroom modification. However it would be a good idea to consider one of the classroom models below as a default setup for your classroom.

**Part 2 Interactive teaching**—This model likewise can work with a standard classroom setup, but for optimum effect the model below is suggested:








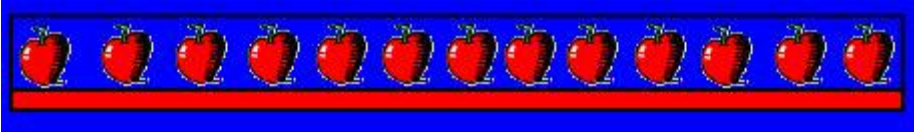


**Part 3 Station teaching**—This classroom model suggests the use of tables, but if that's not possible to obtain groupings of desks can easily be substituted for the large round tables. In this classroom model small groups of students move from one station to another, hence the arrows showing the flow of student groups.

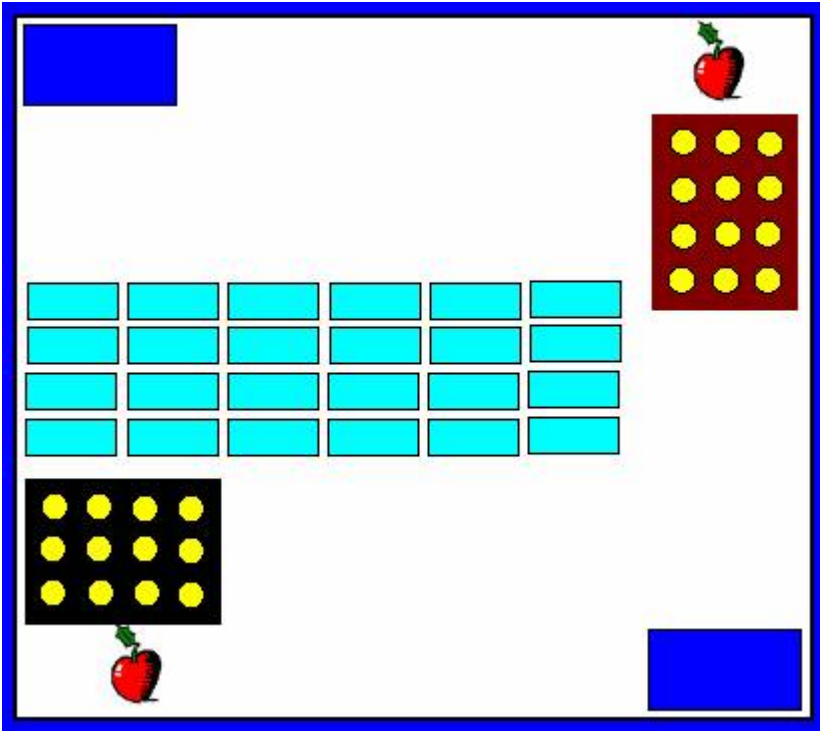

- 5. Round table = 

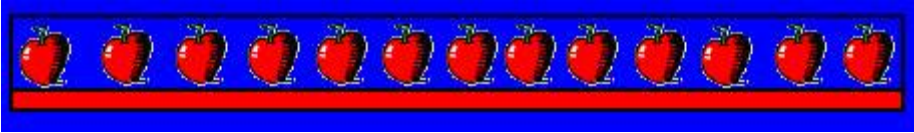


**Part 4 Parallel teaching**—This classroom model has the students moving all of the desks into the center of the classroom and 2 groups gather at opposite corners of the room. Students can take their chairs to each side, they can sit on the floor or possibly on a blanket.

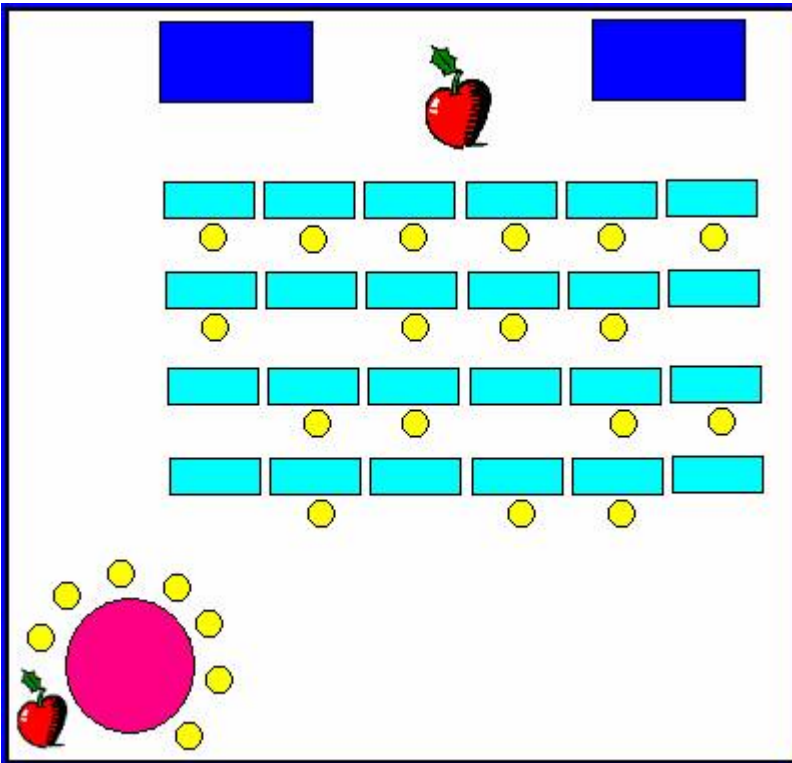

4. Student desks = 

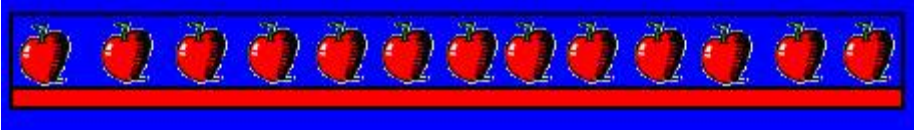


**Part 5 Alternate teaching**—This classroom model is used when a small group of students are taught by one teacher in the back of the room while the majority of students are in the main grouping of student desks. This small group can consist of students with learning disabilities, at risk students and students who have been absent.

Part 6 **Team teaching**—This model of inclusion does not require any classroom modification. A good classroom setup for team teaching would be the Interactive model (number 2).
